#### Right to farm and ranch to be on November ballot

Texas voters can help protect the right to farm and ranch in the Lone Star State this fall.

Since HJR 126, a proposed constitutional amendment, was overwhelmingly passed by the Texas Legislature, the measure will be on the November ballot.

The constitutional amendment, by Rep. DeWayne Burns and Sen. Charles Perry, specifies people have the right to engage in generally accepted farm, ranch, timber production, horticulture, or wildlife management practices on real property they own or lease.

"This constitutional amendment will help ensure that Texans have access to safe and affordable food in the future by strengthening the right to farm and ranch protections," John Ross Copeland, Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau president, said. "It also protects the public from any real danger, and it protects animal care. Plus, it protects water, fish and wildlife, other and resources, as well as protects crops from diseases and pests."

John Ross said. "Now that the protections will be on the November ballot, we encourage all Texans to get out and vote to strengthen the right to farm and ranch in Texas." He noted the amendment does not affect the authority of the legislature to intervene where there is clear evidence of need to protect public health and safety. It also does not affect the authority of the legislature to authorize means to prevent a danger to animal health or production.

"Farming and ranching in Texas is becoming more difficult as our state population grows Texans get disconnected from how we provide them with food, fiber and fuel," John Ross said. "Voting for this constitutional amendment is a vote for to help protect and sustain agriculture in our great state, which in turn helps all Texans."

## Rural Texas - already starved for health care faces a dearth of volunteer first responders

By Jayme Lozano Carver After a tornado barreled through the small town of Matador last month, volunteers mobilized to pick up the pieces so many that the town was closed by law enforcement the following day.

The scene of neighbors helping neighbors sift through debris offered a fresh reminder that in lonely stretches of rural Texas, help after a natural disaster, a house fire or a heart attack is likely to come in the form of volunteers.

An abundance of volunteers, however, is not commonplace. In fact, in nearby Olton, the volunteers who answer the pleas of their fellow residents are worn out and ready to hang up their boots. There is uncertainty

about who will refill the ranks.

"We're getting older and some of us would like to slow down, we've got a couple that's going to retire this year, so that's on our minds all the time," said Jimmy Brooks, director of the Olton Ambulance Volunteer Association. "We just do the best we can with what we've got, and we'll continue to do that as long as we can."

Rural fire trucks ambulances have long been staffed by neighbors and friendly, familiar faces in the community. The will to volunteer can be seen in the face of disasters, but finding consistent volunteers to staff those critical resources is a challenge in rural communities and nationwide.


